Creation Speaks: Exploring the Summer Camp Theme

Genesis 1 is the biblical narrative of God's creative power and love. In it, we understand that God brings the world into being by speaking. Over six days, God takes what is formless through the processes of being, separating, shaping, placing, filling, growing, and forming. At the end of each day, God proclaims it good.

God speaks in Creation, and if we listen, Creation speaks of God. This is the basis of the theme for summer camp. Each daily focus challenges our campers to look more closely at the incredible world around them. Campers discover they are *Invited by Light* and *Refreshed by Water*. They learn about how God, the potter (Jeremiah 18), forms us as we are *Shaped Like Earth*. The rhythm of life and the process of growth are developed as campers explore *Moving through Seasons*. *Kinship with Animals* explores our interdependence with the world around us. God's unique call to us as humans drives our understanding in *Purpose for Humanity* and *Inspired by Creation*.

Our summer curriculum challenges us all to take the time to recognize God's continuing creative work. We connect with Creation when we stop to observe, to listen, and to feel the power and love it represents.

This is the heart of camping ministry. What a blessing it is for us to welcome children, youth, and adults to this place of sanctuary.

Intentional Summer Camp



Campfires, boating, name tags, cookouts, morning dip, saying grace at meals, participating in service projects, and even games like toilet tag are all part of the intentional community of summer camp. Toilet tag as intentional? Yes, even toilet tag.

This week, I am beginning to work with a group of counselors who will be counseling four weeks each this summer at Camp Mack. Many of our discussions around training surround the theme of how summer camp is an intentional community, and everything we do must have a purpose. So, even a game like toilet tag, which is a version of freeze tag, has a purpose. When playing, if a person is tagged, instead of being out, they simply freeze. With the help of a friend, they can be unfrozen and get right back in the game. We all appreciate new chances to continue on.

For training, we are examining all the things that happen in a day at camp and how they can be intentional and reflect the daily themes. I remember years ago, a Team Leader was walking their group up to the dining hall when they noticed baby maple trees growing along the pathway. The team leader took the time to wonder why certain ones grew thick in the soil and others grew sparsely along the gravelly drive. After a while, a camper explained, "Wait! Did we just do Bible Study?" You see, that team leader chose a moment to notice nature at camp and also connect it with the Parable of the Sower that they studied that day.

Stories like that one are why I love working in ministry at camp. Our job is intentional. Facility, Food Service, Office Staff, Volunteers, Prayer Partners, Campers, and Parents, you all have a role in this intentional community of summer camp. Live a life of purpose and find connection in your everyday life.

From Light Displays to Addressing Beach Erosion

Camp is going full swing again, and it sounds great. To see and hear kids shouting and playing is a very good sound to the staff at Camp. We just finished Church of God Family Camp, and they were so happy to be back at Camp Mack. They are probably the longest running rental group we have, and we just love to work with them. They really use the auditorium well and take such good care of it. They have a work weekend in the spring and come and get Quinter Miller Auditorium (what they call The Tabernacle) ready for the season. For their week at Camp, they bring some extra lighting for the stage, and the wall made of rocks at the back of the stage just shines. Camp Mack is a sanctuary where people connect with God, and Quinter Miller Auditorium is a serious part of that.

I have been surprised at the number of facility issues we have had related to the Camp being nearly empty last year. We had several flush and fill valves in the johns that worked very slowly and needed to be replaced. There were several shower heads that produced only a half flow or so and needed to be replaced, too. The entryways on the swimming beach took a beating last summer without the piers to protect them. We added some extra sand to try to correct all of that. The area under where the piers connect to the shore were hit especially hard and we will work on that this fall. We need a better solution to stopping that erosion when the piers are not there.

I want to finish with gratitude for all the volunteers we have had this spring and summer. Time and time again you have come and pitched in to make it happen. Bless you for that!

Cheesecake Bars with an M&M Twist

I have a favorite tried and true recipe that I have shared before, but it has a new twist! I LOVE making our chocolate chip cheesecake bars during retreat season. They are so good when they are still warm and gooey, but I really enjoy them as leftovers (if there's ever any left!) cold right out of the fridge. The chocolate has a fun crunch and the cheesecake is the perfect temperature. But last month for the South/Central Women's Camp, I decided to add mini baking M&Ms instead of chocolate chips. Best decision ever!! They were SO good! The staff loved them; the women loved them; I LOVED them! Since then, I keep thinking of other things I could add instead of the chocolate chips like Andes Mint pieces, or Reese's Pieces (if I wasn't serving them at home or to guests with nut allergies). The possibilities are endless. I can't wait to try out some of my new ideas!! Let me know if you try a great combination!!

Chip Cookie Dough:

1 Cup Margarine
1 Cup Butter
2 Cups Brown Sugar
1 Cup White Sugar
4 Eggs
2 Teaspoons Vanilla
1 Teaspoon Baking Soda
1.5 Teaspoons Salt
5 Cups Flour
4 Cups Chocolate Chips (Can substitute with M&Ms, other flavor chips, or candy bits)

In a mixing bowl, cream together margarine, butter, sugars, eggs, and vanilla until light and fluffy.

Combine dry ingredients, and slowly add to creamed mixture. Add chips last.

Spread a little more than half of the cookie dough on a greased sheet tray.

Cheesecake Filling:

16 oz Cream Cheese, softened
1 Cup Sugar
2 Eggs
1 Teaspoon Vanilla Extract

Beat cream cheese in mixer until fluffy

Add in sugar

Beat in eggs and vanilla

Pour cheesecake filling over the spread cookie dough

Crumble remaining dough and plop it on top of the cheesecake filling

Bake at 325 (convection oven) degrees for 25–30 minutes

Cool and cut

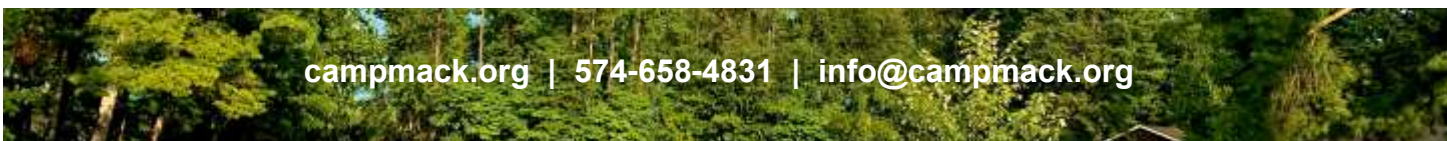

- Repair the electrical system in the East Stone restroom

- Repair the Mission Village boardwalk—fully funded
