A Time of Rest



Come and see what the Lord has done, the desolations he has brought on the earth. He makes wars cease to the ends of the earth. He breaks the bow and shatters the spear; he burns the shields with fire. He says, "Be still, and know that I am God; I will be exalted among the nations, I will be exalted in the earth." The Lord Almighty is with us; the God of Jacob is our fortress. -Psalm 46:8– 11 (NIV)

In the middle of December, I returned to the Camp Mack office after a time of sabbath, generously supported by the staff and Indiana Camp Board. I spent two months stepping away from the ministry of Camp Mack to refresh relationships with family, church, and God. I pursued this through some limited travel, spending more time with my own congregation, and writing. It was a wonderful experience, and it allowed Camp Mack and me to grow in faith and trust.

When I was moderator for the Northern Indiana District, our District Conference theme was this passage from Psalm 46. The entire psalm is beautiful and reassuring. It discusses the power of God to provide for our needs and safety. The writer composed it as a hymn with three parts, each ending with the word, "Selah." Selah is not meant to be read or sung, it is an instruction to the hymn leader to "stop and listen" after each part.

These verses are the third part of the hymn. We often hear the words in the first half of verse 10, when God tells us to stop our clamoring and recognize that God is in control. Often, we confuse this passage with the one from Mark 4, verse 39 when Jesus calms the waters of the sea by proclaiming, "Peace, be still." But, that's not what the psalmist means. We are not receiving a sudden reprieve from the chaos of the world; instead, we are asked to step back for a moment, take a breath, and find God amid the storm. In the entire psalm we are challenged to step back, stop what we are doing, listen, and put our faith and trust in God.

Sometimes we can get caught up in our everyday struggles, feeling that we can't stop powering through, even for a moment, with the fear that we will lose the battle ahead. Yet, when we take the time to stop and listen, God often shows us a new way. In the pause, we are empowered to continue the work, because we are reminded of God's constant presence. **Gene Hollenberg, Executive Director**

It was a great fall for getting work projects done. We also had several groups of volunteers come alongside and help us. Early in the fall, Jim Bates came up and helped us put some vertical siding on the gable ends of Jacobs Well. With the new roof already on, Jacob's Well looks brand new! That facility is such a simple building, but it is heavily used in spring, summer, and fall, and it is right in the center of our campus, so it is important to take good care of it.

Another project we completed this fall with the help of the Shoue family was the deck at the home that I live in. I am guessing that the deck was originally put down when the building was built in the early 80's, so it had served well. Day Family Camp donated the funds to do this, and the Shoue family came and put it on. The Shoue family has come up the last several years and had a family get-together as well as a volunteer weekend. This year they cut down five or six dead trees and cut them up for firewood. Then, they built the deck. The deck looks great as you can see in the pictures at the bottom of this article.

This summer we had a tree assessment done by Dogwood Hills Tree Farm. They performed a level one assessment of all the trees on our main campus. There were 636 trees and 49 unique species identified. There were 21 considered diseased or damaged and 71 in the last 20% of their life. Many of the rest of the trees need to be pruned to prolong their life. Our plan is to start to work through the diseased and damaged trees and then to the pruning. This report will help us to identify what new species we may need to introduce to our campus as we have gifts to plant new trees. Our goal is to always have lots of trees for kids to play under and birds to nest in.

February 22




